Recap of I/RG Discussion

- General support in piloting the SDM proposal
- Focus on de-listing Mid-Columbia Steelhead could be a big win for the CBC
- SCEE values are key to the goals of CBC and in CBPTF
- Resources and capacity need to be considered

Achieving I/RG Consensus

The SDM would lead to the I/RG reaching consensus because:

- The SDM framework breaks goals down into very specific and achievable pieces.
- The SDM framework is mostly an analytical tool, and the Mid-Columbia steelhead pilot effort would be an opportunity to test out the whole decision-making process.



Structured Decision Making Proposal

SDM Proposal – Process Suggestions

- 1. Ensure understanding of the CBP's quantitative and qualitative goals and the SCEE values from the CBPTF Phase 2 Report.
- 2. Review the scenarios from the CBPTF Phase 2 Report and identify the actions that make up the scenarios.
- 3. Identify any additional necessary actions not included in the CBPTF scenarios.
- 4. Confirm agreement on using existing analyses, supplemented as needed, to assess scenarios.

SDM Proposal - Process

- 5. Assess and summarize the benefits of each action on stocks (e.g., Mid-Columbia Steelhead)
- 6. Evaluate the temporal aspects of benefits to determine when they will be realized.
- 7. Analyze each action's impact on SCEE values.
- 8. Combine actions to create a scenario that benefits Mid-Columbia Steelhead, and achieves SCEE outcomes, and bring to the I/RG for review.

SCEE Values Origin

- Stems from CBP efforts to integrate the "people side" of the Columbia Basin into discussions about the future of salmon.
- The CBP adopted a Qualitative Goal to "Make decisions within a broader context that reflects and considers effects to the full range of social, cultural, economic, and ecosystem values and diversity in the Columbia Basin."
 - CBP members presented on their communities and constituencies, and held discussions to understand the reasons behind people's positions.
 - CBP members participated in small group exercises and a half-day workshop, and shared experiences from where they live and work in the Basin.

Why SCEE Values?


"The proposition of changing course is not as threatening when it is prefaced with an understanding that our current situation was created by a certain set of social, cultural, economic, and environmental values, and that those values may be combined in different ways to create better results for all. People stop thinking about a problem in terms of "winners" and "losers" and begin to explore different ways of sharing the benefits so all enjoy them.

Ultimately, these perspectives do not represent an "end" but rather the means to incorporate a more creative way to think about challenges ahead, with the hopes of moving toward a win-win solution. Meeting the needs of our diverse landscape — while leaving future generations with resilient fish and wildlife populations, and a healthy ecosystem — will take ingenuity, innovation, and teamwork. This diversity, however, is also our strength. By listening to each other and recognizing our different interests, people can pinpoint common problems, identify sustainable solutions, and join forces to address them effectively."


